Growing Orchids in a Terrarium

Daniel L. Geiger, PhD, is a marine invertebrate systematist working on biodiversity and evolution of basal marine snails at the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History. His interests in plants come from natural history photography and gardening. He is a member of the Orchid Society of Santa Barbara, SCOSS, and the California Native Plant Society, and has been growing native California orchids outdoors, and more recently added an indoor terrarium with tropical orchids.

Growing orchids in a terrarium is similar to growing in a miniature greenhouse with artificial lights. An overview of all aspects of planning, installation, and running a plant terrarium is provided. Special emphasis is given to automatic control of environmental parameters (light, temperature, moisture). The second half of the talk discusses species-

performance with many phologies.

Speaker's Choice

December speaker Norito Hasegawa selected Sophronitis (Cattleya) cernua grown by Peter Lin. Peter grows this plant outdoors, in a sheltered area. While protected from the baking summer sun, it still experiences the temperature extremes of Diamond Bar, both triple-digit summer heat and the occasional subfreezing winter cold. The flowers have particularly good form, size, and color.

According to Charles Baker, this plant was first found in the area of Rio de Janeiro, and it is also found along





the Brazilian coast. The flowers of these coastal plants tend to have somewhat pale or faded flowers. Plants with more brightly colored flowers grow far inland in the states of Minas Gerais and São Paulo. Those areas also tend to be higher and cooler. This plant, with its brilliant flowers and cold-tolerance, no doubt draws its ancestry from one of those inland locations. The petals are very crystalline, and glisten in the sunlight.

Editor's Potting Bench

While the rest of the country is busy shoveling itself out from under lots of snow, my orchids (and I am sure yours too) are celebrating the holidays in California style. Laelia anceps are putting on a spectacular show. I am finding that the flowers tend to last a bit longer when the plants are left outside (the house is warm and very dry), but then they are vulnerable to bugs (thrips, especially, do not seem to be deterred by the chilly nights) and botryitis, especially if it gets damp at night along with the cold. Fortunately the latter problem has been pretty much held in check by very low humidity. With night temperatures in the 30's, the single-digit humidity has been giving the plants an extra bit of protection. The short days pose a challenge in figuring out when it is best to water. Too early, and the plants will stay wet and cold too long before the sun dries them. Too late, and they won't dry out before nightfall. But the middle of the day is sunny, very dry, and fairly warm, so they do need water. I have found that right around 10 AM is the sweet spot.

Speaking of L. anceps... we are in, or very near, the ideal time to pot or mount them. While most members of the Cattleya tribe are ideally potted when the roots first appear, L. anceps does better if done in anticipation of the

roots. Then, when they appear, there is no risk of damaging the fragile tips, which would stop their development cold. When I have had any of these in pots, they

struggle until reaching the edge of the pot, then they take off. Clearly they don't want to be in pots, They really grow best mounted. I have some small ones that did not bloom this year, and they are already rooting

(actually, started back in November). If you have a plant that is blooming and starting to root at the same time, get the job done... the flowers won't mind, and you'll catch it at the optimum time. January, or maybe early February will still be OK for the late bloomers, but don't procrastinate or you'll miss the "window". That beautiful L. anceps var. veitchiana 'Elizabeth's Eyes' x 'Neptune' came bare-root from our 2010 auction, I mounted it at that time, and has rewarded my efforts. Thank you, thank you to the donor. The blue-violet blush on the petals is not an artifact of photography, it is very real and wonderful.

Another "December surprise", this one living in the greenhouse, was Cattleya percivaliana var. semi-alba 'Jewel'. I got this a couple of years ago from a society plant table (not ours), bare root, and this is the first time that it has bloomed for me. Again, thank you to the person who donated it. The photograph does not do it justice—that lip is almost fluorescent. The standard C. percivaliana is also very beautiful (see the website) but this one has a special charm.

There are lots of other things just starting to bud—it will be a great year for Lycastes, I think. Here is one more little gem that is starting to produce lots of new buds that are opening now, will do more over the

next month or two-Pleurothallis ornata. The little fringes wave in the breeze. It blooms successively on each inflorescence, so don't cut them until they are definitely dead and dry. I have also seen this referred to as

Pths. schiedei, but that name is given in Orchidwiz (and on IOSPE) as a synonym for Pths. villosa, which is a quite different plant. Both of them are now classified as Stelis.
