World Orchid Conference: Johannesburg, South Africa Phyllis Prestia

Phyllis S. Prestia, Ed.D. is a retired educator and Middle School Principal. Originally from New Jersey, she moved to California with her husband to retire in the sunny, San Diego area and grow orchids. Her collection includes a variety of species and hybrids across several genera grown both in a small greenhouse and three outdoor growing areas under shade cloth.

In her orchid life she has been the President of the San Diego County Cymbidium Society and currently serves as the Vice President of the Cymbidium Society of America, as well as keeping active in several Southern California orchid societies. She is

currently participating in the orchid judge training programs of both the American Orchid Society and Cymbidium Society of America.

This talk is "Part Two" of Phyllis' Africa trip. After visiting Madagascar (the topic of her talk last year) she went on to Johannesburg, South Africa to attend the World Orchid Congress. She also participated in judging . She will share with us her photographs of the orchids of Africa, and the displays and awarded orchids that she saw at the WOC.

Speaker's Choice

January speaker Peter Lin selected Microcoelia gilpinae, grown by Scott McGregor, as his Speaker's Choice plant because of its rarity and uniqueness. This is a leafless orchid with tiny, brilliant orange flowers. Scott particularly was interested in this species since most Microcoelias are white. Scott grows this outside, as he does with all of his plants. Scott, thanks for the close-up photo.

Microcoelia gilpinae is endemic to Madagascar.

According to the Internet Orchid Species Photo Encyclopedia (www.orchidspecies.com), it grows in eastern Madagascar in mossy rain forests on twigs and small branches, at elevations from 330 ft (100 m) to 5900 ft (1800 m). This wide elevation range indicates that it can thrive in a wide range of temperatures. When the roots are wet, they are green (as with essentially all epiphytic orchids), showing the chlorophyll that conducts photosynthesis for the plant, here in the complete absence of leaves.

Editor's Potting Bench

Shade cloth can do a lot more than reduce the intensity of sunbeams. I had about 5 minutes of dumping hail, and the shade cloth did nicely in preventing the shredding of a lot of blooming Laelia anceps and Cymbidiums. This is what the area looked like. That white stuff in the shade cloth is hailstones... took about 3 hours to finally melt away!



I am going to be watching to see if some of the Pleurothalids and other plants that are sensitive to salts perk up with the dousing of rain washing away years of city water. If so, that might accelerate my timetable for a RO system. I did end up with some botrytis, but not too bad. I did bring a few blooming plants into the house, that would have otherwise stayed outside because of size, to save the flowers. Fortunately the cloud cover kept temperatures up through nights pretty well. It's when it rains and then the clouds clear permitting temperatures to plummet during the night that it is most dangerous.

Scott and I bought some European and Australian terrestrials last fall, and we both have been seeing a little action from them. Here is Ophyrys ariandnae. If you were a bee, wouldn't you be fascinated? Scott sent me a photo of his Ophrys sphegodes—and a bee does seem to be interested. (OK, honey bees are females, so maybe and maybe not...but great photo...)

Some other terrestrials are waking up as well. Old reliable Pterostylis curta is starting to put on a terrific show. This one you're seen, and will probably make it to the meeting. Another one, that may not, is Bonatea speciosa. My plant did well last year, and I put in a 3-gallon pot where it produced multiple growths, so not very portable. I think after it blooms it's going to get divided. Growths die back, and may produce a non-blooming growth later in the year, die back and then do the blooming growth right about now.





Some of the little Pleurothallids are better appreciated in photos. Scaphosepalum gibberosum tends to pop out one bird-like flower at a time sequentially on an inflorescence, and the flowers are not particularly long-lived

so it requires lucky timing to be in bloom for a meeting though a given spike may keep going for months. So, enjoy it here.



Maxillaria lepidota is putting on a floriferous show. Unfortunately, it probably won't last to the meeting, so here it is. It grows quite happily outside on my patio.
