## **Speaker's Choice**

September speaker Doug Overstreet selected the group of Habenaria medusa, grown by Richard (Dick) Hess, as his speakers's choice. There were three plants, each with a long spike of wonderful, fringed flowers. During the warmer months, Dick grows these outside in a sheltered area next to his greenhouse. In winter and early spring, these terrestrial plants go completely dormant. They can move into the greenhouse taking up minimal space, and receive little water until late spring when the cycle begins again.

Habenaria medusa is native to the islands of Sumatra, Java, Borneo, and Sulawesi, at elevations of a few hundred to 3000 ft. They experience a significant dry period. They do receive dew, so do want a little moisture while they are dormant.




#### From the Member's Corner

# **Editor's Potting Bench**

The big news is our annual auction! This is where you can provide the support that the club needs to operate for the year, and also enhance your own collection. I have a bit of a preview of what will be offered since I'm doing the data-management including getting all those plants and their numbers into the computer. We don't have everything yet as I write this, but already we have one of the most interesting, diverse collections of plants to sell that I have ever seen. Janet Robertson, Susan Scheffler, Edie Gulrich, and myself are working on assembling photos and cultural information on each plant, and that information will be on the website along with the listings starting approximately Wednesday before the auction. Keep checking back, because I expect that we'll be adding to it right up to auction time. Bring your friends, neighbors, anyone who might be persuaded that they need an orchid (or another orchid). Donations of snacks, of course, are needed and welcomed-bidding makes people hungry.

Don't forget the other orchid-acquiring activities that the month brings, either. The weekend of Sept. 30– Oct 2 is open house at Andy's Orchids. Oct, 21-23 is the show and sale at the Huntington. There will be some vendors who don't usually come to southern California, who are coming because this is also the AOS Trustee's Meeting. Thanks to the AOS meeting, Tom Mirenda the Orchid Collection Specialist at the Smithsonian, will be the speaker at the regular meeting of the Orange County Orchid Society Wednesday, October 19. This is a prime blooming season for bifoliate Cattleya species. One that I especially love is Cattleya schilleriana. This one blooms at least twice a year. I grow it outside all year around, under a polycarbonate "hard cover" to keep it dry during the winter. I have found that this is helpful for quite a few Cattleya-group species that otherwise would probably prefer a greenhouse. Don't confuse this species with the hybrid Lc. Schilleriana (note capitalization) that is C. intermedia x L. purpurata; with reclassification of the Brazillian Laelias as Cattleya, the hybrid becomes C. Schilleriana, which has no relation (other that genus) with the species C. schilleriana. <sigh>

Cattleya (now Guarianthe) bowringiana blooms around



this time. There is some variation on when particular plants bloom, which is lovely since each has a chance to shine. C. bowringiana f. coerulea bloomed for me last month. Now, it is C. bowringiana 'One in a Million'. Take a good look... There's a plant of this one ('One in a Million x self) for auction.



Trichoglottis bracheata var. philippinensis doesn't come to meetings because it is too hard to transport. It tends to send out branches in all directions. However, it is really a beauty, and I love it for its dark segments and fascinating lip. It started as a cutting from Ed Wise, and now is big enough that I will share a branch in the auction. This one does need a greenhouse. Ed taught me how to get these going. They have roots all over the

place, and once established they do just fine in the air. However, to get it started, some of the roots should go into bark in a pot, with the plant supported on some sort of substrate—hapu'u slab, or even just some plastic "egg crate" light diffuser will work.



It's certainly important to give a nod to the Catasetinae, some of which are starting to bloom just before they go into their winter dormancy. This year, I put them all outside once nights warmed up to about 55 deg. F. I am seeing much better growth than I got in the in the greenhouse, and fewer pests, especially spider mites. When it starts to get cold, they go back into the greenhouse, but by then they'll be losing leaves (taking up less space), and they'll be protected from rain and all watering.


